My Brothers,

As we go from month-to-month with our Scottish Rite activities, I suspect that we often forget about what is happening "behind the scenes" within our Valley, and none of them with any reimbursement for their time. For instance:

Our Secretary, Illustrious Brother Bob Cook is constantly working with the Supreme Council and its personnel database (Sentinel) to provide accurate membership tracking, dues tracking, and dealing with unique individual situations as our Brothers move, or pass, or otherwise need some type of special support. And additionally, he works the minutes of past meetings, and agendas for future meetings.

Our Treasurer, Brother Cliff Snow, is in the office at least two mornings every single week, working finances – dues receipt, payment of bills, statements on our investment accounts, and generally dealing with all things financial.

I'm on the phone or a zoom with our Director of Education, Brother Craig Fabec at least twice a week (not mention a dozen emails and texts) as he plans, coordinates, and approves educational initiatives for the Valley.

Brothers of Scottish Rite, we often talk about looking for new Brothers to join this organization of the Masonic Fraternity. What qualities do we need to consider when looking for new candidates? Scottish Rite is often referred to as the "University of Freemasonry". This gives the first hint. We are a dedicated group of men of service to Masonry and Brotherhood but most especially to the knowledge that Masonry offers to us. If a candidate simply wishes to become a 32° Mason and assumes that once he has gone through the 3 -day conferring of degrees at a reunion that he will have sufficiently obtained the knowledge the degrees offer, he is mistaken. Only further study can enlighten him to the deeper meanings. This should be an indication when considering a new candidate.

In the 8°, 'Intendant of the Building in' Morals and Dogma, (Annotated edition by Arturo De Hoyos 33° page 209) it states, "none are entitled to advance in the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, who have not by study and application made themselves familiar with Masonic learning and jurisprudence. The Degrees of this Rite are not for those who are content with mere work and ceremonies, and do not seek to explore the mines of wisdom that lie buried below the surface."

Furthermore, in A Bridge to Light, in the 8th degree lecture, (page 50) it states that "Pike often uses the lectures in Morals and Dogma to explain Masonry – its history, doctrines, and teachings – and only to hint at philosophical ideas and arguments, enticing the Mason to reflect and develop a positive approach to life. This is a process in which the Mason must participate in order to benefit."

These are only a couple of examples which explain the importance of further study and participation to obtain knowledge. The Master Craftsman course is a good place to start.

So, brothers, when considering a new candidate for Scottish Rite, look for the men who are seeking more knowledge. These men will benefit more greatly for joining the Brotherhood, and the brethren will benefit more greatly from them. Please do not think that I am being arrogant, or judgmental, quite the opposite, but the more I learn, the more I gain personally and the more I can be of benefit to the collective knowledge of the Fraternity and my Brothers.

HOT Pipe Organ Capital Campaign

Since 1916 the Temple Room at the House of the Temple has had an Organ to make our events even more special with music. The Shantz organ console located behind Lieutenant Grand Commander's Chair controls the sound from the 1,417 pipes located high above floor level. The acoustics perfectly allow the room to be flooded with sound. Typically, the organ is played by the Grand Organist for various Masonic events and ceremonies. On occasion, guest organists hold concerts in the Temple Room. The public also visits the Temple Room every week during tours at the HOT.

The current Shantz Organ needs rebuilding and improvement. Currently, only about 50% of the keys will produce correct sounds. This is why the Scottish Rite has opened the HOT Pipe Organ Capital Campaign to save our treasured Organ. We formed a committee of members with vast knowledge and experience in Organs to plan this work. We need to keep music as an important part of the ceremonies and rituals of our fraternity.

Our goal is to raise \$400,000 to pay for restoration, improvements to the instrument, and provide an endowment to pay for its maintenance and repairs in the future. Members all around the Southern Jurisdiction are giving, and we are making progress, but we are counting on every member's help – and your help – to reach the goal.


